Ayenda Learning Center in Bamiyan

Dear Friends,

On March 25, 2009 the Ayenda Foundation inaugurated the Ayenda Learning Center, a new school in the historic and picturesque province of Bamiyan. The inauguration ceremony was attended by Bamiyam's Governor, Ms. Habiba Sarabi, Afghanistan's Ambassador to the U.S. Said T. Jawad, Ayenda Foundation Founder Shamim Jawad and a number of Afghan and international guests.

This Learning Center will provide 300 children with a modern educational facility and enhanced vocational training opportunities, unavailable in this impoverished province. Standing two stories tall and housing 24 rooms, the cost-effective construction of the Learning Center was made possible by the Bayat Foundation with support from local civil society and the office of the governor. It was funded through private donations by generous U.S. individuals and corporations.

This was a dream come true for all of us who care for Afghan children and work very hard for the Ayenda Learning Center to become a reality. Being at the opening was an incredible moment. The beautiful children of this historic valley that once was a center of science and spirituality along the Silk Road are now receiving the care and attention that they deserve from their friends and supporters in Afghanistan and United States.

We are also so happy to see many developments occur in the past few months--including new classes, an outdoor kitchen, outdoor restrooms, and a hand water pump.



NEW CLASSES AT THE AYENDA LEARNING CENTER

Health Class

A local doctor offered his services to the school once a week and teach a rotating group of students basic health care and also gives free check-ups to the students, many of whom have never been to a doctor before. We hope that this will prevent illnesses and also inspire the children to take an active role in their own health.

Civil Rights Class

A civil rights group based in Bamiyan has generously offered to teach a class on civil rights. In this class the children are learning about their

individual rights and the Afghan Constitution. It is incredibly important that these children are aware of their rights as well as those of others.

English Class

A student from the American University of Afghanistan (who is our Representative's sister) is returning to Bamiyan for the summer break and has become the Center's first English teacher. Learning English, even just the basics, at an early age will increase the potential of these children exponentially. The children are extremely excited about these classes and I have to give all the credits to our Rep who is doing a remarkable job for us and for his own people.

Structural Developments at the Ayenda Learning Center

After completing the Ayenda Learning Center we learned that we needed to build an outdoor kitchen, outdoor restrooms, and a hand water pump to make the school more functional.

The construction of the outdoor kitchen and bathrooms was done by a local builder Zahac company and is seventy-percent completed.

We are very excited about our new hand water pump built by the local New Zealand PRT (Provincial Reconstruction Team). Our Rep Mohammed has done a great job in persuading them to help us. They promised to buy us a backup generator as well. We are so grateful to have a backup system put in place so that the children may always have access to drinking water at the Center.

Vocational Workshop Update

We hope to have the Vocational Center completed next year. The Ministry of Education did not have the budget this year to pay for the salary of the teachers, but promised to include it in the next year's budget. We are currently in need of building the workshop and purchase the equipment.
